I. Concept

Ebola outbreak in West Africa - Protocol for Western infection control and African realities

The Ebola outbreak in West Africa is unprecedented in its extent and dynamic and has presented a new paradigm for infectious disease management. This outbreak demonstrates, once again, that a slow response has devastating effects on people, impairing their health, damaging their economies, restricting their travel and trade, affecting cultures, and ultimately disrupting their lives entirely. Far beyond its biomedical impact, Ebola affects entire societies in West Africa and globally.

The current Ebola outbreak has also demonstrated a clash of cultures: strong, interwoven communities in West Africa have their own organisational, social, cultural and religious structures and rationales, and the application of a western infection control pattern has met with communities' resistance, thus stifling an effort where cooperation is urgently needed.

CORDS approach: Community – Care – Communication

CORDS connects infectious disease surveillance networks globally, working continuously with people at the district and community levels to build trust, strengthen capacity through collaboration and information sharing and engages in skill building activities. CORDS, together with SACIDS, organised an emergency meeting "EBOLA: Lessons learned from past outbreaks to inform current risk management" in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania on 1-2 September 2014. The key lesson learned from this meeting is that infectious disease management has to be developed with and built within communities. Community-based solutions will drive successful outbreak preparation and capacity building in communities to detect and respond to outbreaks. By formulating solutions communities also facilitate a communication process that introduces safe practices for providing care to sick relatives.

Community – Care – Communication represent the leading principles of the "*Intensified Preparedness Programme* (IPP)". This programme offers:

- Capacity building for training in affected and not yet affected countries;
- Online material to learn about this capacity building approach; and
- Executive briefings to advise risk management and risk communication

2. IPP trainings: approach and target groups

The governing focus of our approach is community-based care and communication. CORDS and its partners work on the basis of strategic risk management and risk communication.

We target:

- Supervisors,
- Coordinators, and
- Decision-makers

that conceptualise and shape frontline health care approaches, risk management, community outreach and risk communication.

We envision training a group of 18 participants from Ghana and surrounding countries who will impart instructive approaches, content, and techniques to a variety of populations across countries. The training takes place over two days and is based on small, interactive and facilitated group work sessions that apply analytical tools to find more suitable, innovative solutions for community-based infectious disease management. We do not rely on a fixed curriculum, but offer an analytical, creative, and flexible framework to develop better and adequate solutions that work in a variety of social and cultural environments.
