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One Health concept

2005 Manhattan Principles: *One World, One Health*

Movement of diseases between animals (domestic, wildlife) and humans

2007 Delhi conference: Medium-term strategy to better address EID
Better understanding of the drivers and causes around the emergence and spread of infectious diseases is needed, under the broad perspective of the '***One World, One Health***' (OWOH) principles

2008 Strategic Framework *Contributing to One World, One Health - A Strategic Framework for Reducing Risks of Infectious Diseases at the Animal–Human–Ecosystems Interface*

WHO, OIE, FAO, UNICEF, World bank, UN Influenza

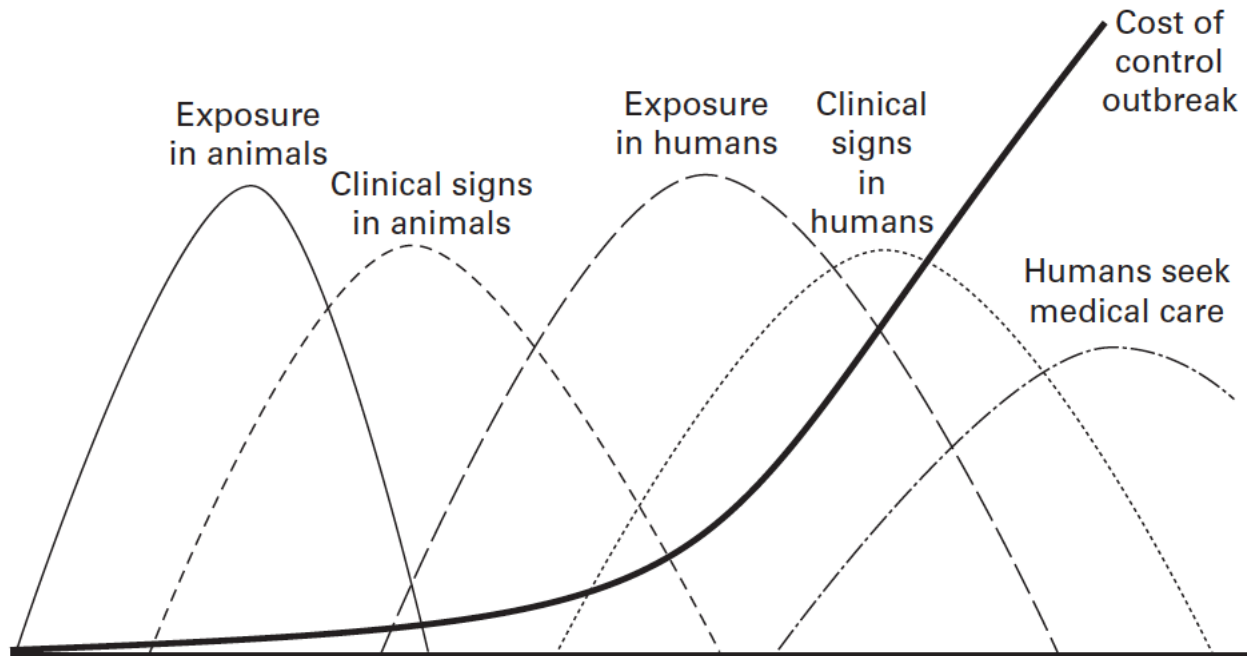


One Health concept

One Health refers to *“the collaborative efforts of multiple disciplines working locally, nationally and globally to attain optimal health for people, animals and our environment.”* (2008)

One Health concept

Five strategic elements

- **Surveillance:** Building robust and well-governed public and animal health systems: **WHO** International Health Regulations (IHR 2005) and **OIE** Performance of Veterinary Services (PVS)
- **Response:** Improve national and international emergency response capabilities
- **Integration:** Shift focus from potential to actual disease problems, and through a focus on the drivers of a broader range of locally important diseases
- **Collaboration:** Promote wide-ranging collaboration across sectors and disciplines
- **Implementation:** Develop rational and targeted disease control programmes
